Typically for BaltGirls it was a warm and sunny day when we started our trip to Tallinn. First point of interest was the renovated and newly opened Tallinn TV Tower. When Estonia was still behind the Iron Curtain, this was for many Estonians a window to the free world - at night one could even catch sight of the lights of Helsinki. The Tower was built for the 1980 Olympic regatta - the exhibition inside this gives a good overview of the nostalgic 1980s and the gloomy events of 1991 when Estonia regained independence.
